



## DEAN'S MESSAGE

With pride in the collective achievements of faculty, students, and staff from the College of Health and Human Services, the 2017-18 Annual Report serves to highlight some of the major activities and accomplishments during the academic year.

This past year the College faced challenges with enrollment, retention, resources, and facilities. While these problems could have impeded progress, the College moved forward with energy, enthusiasm, and innovation to address or mitigate the negative effects of the challenges.

The report will highlight our efforts to improve retention and success of students through the implementation of the University Budget Advisory Committee grant that was awarded to our college. While not funded until the spring, we immediately began to direct efforts to actualize the plan outlined in the grant proposal. Closely related, we will share our strategies for improving the quality of academic, professional, and personal advisement of students and our plan to focus more intentionally on the importance of this professional responsibility.

High Impact Practices are espoused by our College to improve the internship experience for students and sites, to increase the opportunities for clinical and experiential learning, to engage undergraduate students in research activities through RESS, and to embrace the new approach to writing across the curriculum with the development of department writing plans. Additionally, the college faculty have invested in the development of Teamwork courses as another strategy for impacting student retention and success.

Our college funding initiatives related to space, innovation, and hands-on experience for students will be identified and the progress made to date on each of these will be shared.

As a college, we offer academically sound programs that are in demand. However, with that strength comes the need to have students encounter the best faculty experts in the classroom, offer rich experiential learning outside the classroom, foster student success by accessibility to appropriate support mechanisms, have strong clerical support for department faculty and students, mentor new faculty and new students, be fiscally responsible in the managing of limited resources, and engage faculty and students in scholarship and service opportunities. This report will demonstrate our commitment to these ideals.

As a college, we are moving forward - always with a focus on improving performance through authentic assessment and analysis. We are committed to our students and continue to graduate informed adults who are ready to join the workforce as competent professionals empowered to make a difference as responsible citizens in their communities and the world.

Professor Lon Ferguson served as the HHS Dean's Associate for Administration in 2017/18. In his short time with the Dean's Office, Dr. Ferguson implemented the HHS Retention and Persistence UBAC Initiative, supported the Hospitality Management self-study for accreditation, reconfigured the college internship infrastructure, assisted the Institute for Rural Health and Safety with the sole sponsorship of the IUP Paramedic certificate, and was integral in the approval of the new Fall 2018 AAS in Culinary Arts and the AS in Hospitality Management.

Ferguson '81, M'86 is also a two-time alumnus from the IUP department of Safety Sciences and a '94 Alumnus of the University of Pittsburgh, where he earned his Doctorate of Education in Higher Education Administration. 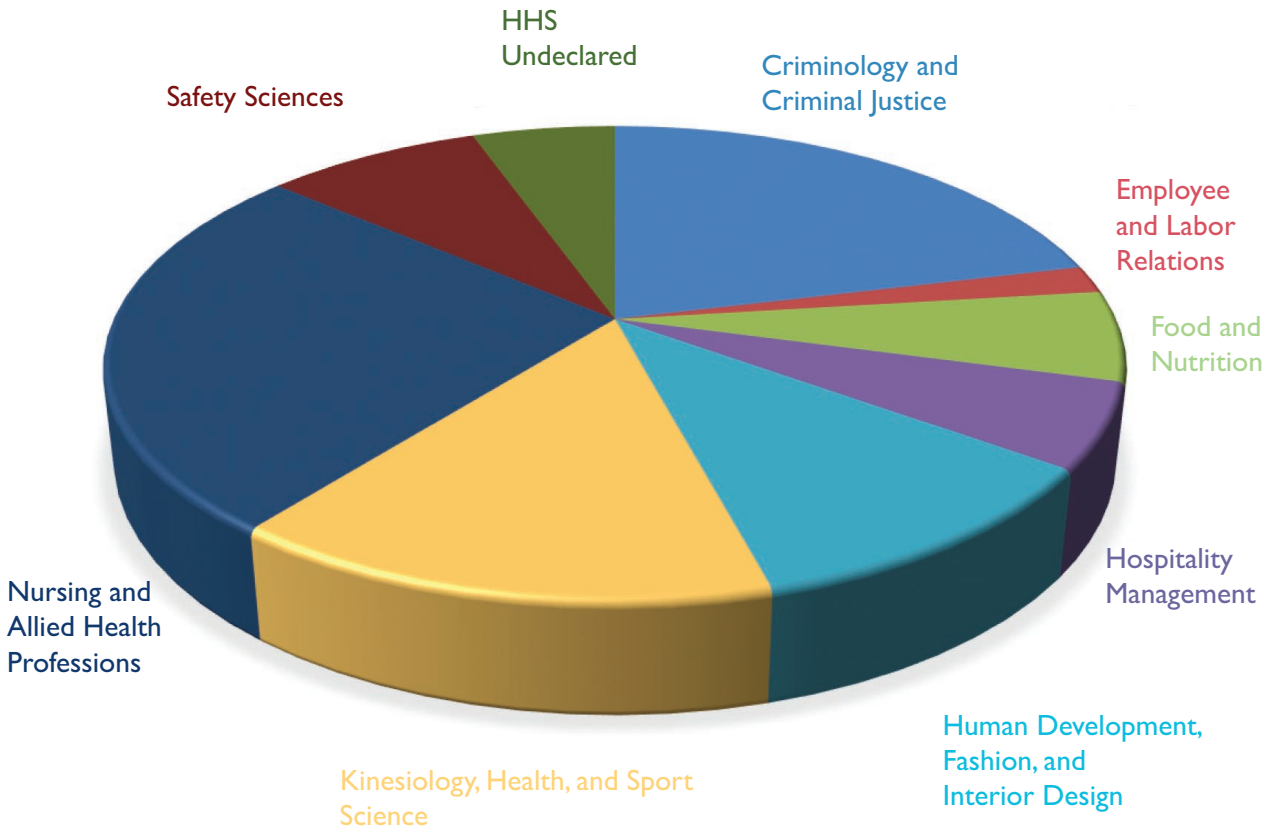

# NEW ADDITIONS TO HHS!



In April 2018, IUP offered the first training for persons wishing to become Clinical Medical Assistants (CMA). The 18-month program is offered at IUP Punxsutawney Campus and is divided into six, three-month sessions. The CMA Program combines training in clinical procedures with training in office skills. This specialized curriculum is designed to provide complete professional training in all facets of managing an administrative medical position in a physician's office, hospital, clinic, pharmacy, medical or surgical supply company, long-term care facility, insurance company, or any other business in the healthcare field.

Effective Fall 2017, students in HHS Respiratory Care bachelor's degree program complete their upper division respiratory courses at IUP's Northpointe campus in Freeport. Students in the Respiratory Care Program complete the first two years of the curriculum at the Indiana campus. These courses include preclinical courses in chemistry, biology, physics, and mathematics and the required liberal studies courses. Previously, students completed the last two years (59 credits) of the coursework at Western Pennsylvania Hospital School of Respiratory Care. Students in the program continue to complete clinical experiences at hospitals, long-term care facilities, and home health care agencies, including Western Pennsylvania Hospital, Allegheny General Hospital, Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh, and West Penn Hospital.

# UNIVERSITY BUDGET ADVISORY COMMITTEE GRANT



Academic Recovery Assistants

In December 2017 the college received a University Budget Advisory Committee award for \$52,084 to support three specific retention strategies. The first strategy was to hire additional Academic Recovery Assistants to provide support that will target second semester freshmen and sophomores who fall within a GPA range of 2.0-2.25. This strategy also expanded existing tutoring and “supplemental instruction” to the more challenging courses required within our college.

The second strategy involved a College Faculty Workshop on Academic/Developmental Advising which would ultimately lead to the development of a “College Model for Advisement.” The Advisor Lead Training was completed on May 30 – June 1st. During the summer months the Advisor Leads developed the college advisement model and created a D2L Advisement Assistant for all HHS departments.

The third strategy was to provide financial assistance through an “Institutional Scholarship Account” for all HHS students that will be awarded on a “need basis.”

CHHS believes that these retention strategies used in tandem will improve the current retention rate of 70% to 73% for FY 2017/18 and to 75% for FY 2018/19 and 2019/20. This 4.5% increase in retention and a 2.5% increase in persistence will retain 76 students for a total revenue of \$1,846,192 over the remaining three years at IUP.

The IUP Police Academy celebrated 40 years in 2017. In that time, thousands of police officers have graduated and received their Act 120 certification through the IUP Criminal Justice Training Center. In 2017-2018, 89 cadets graduated from the program, receiving the highest level of professional police training. These individuals qualify to be hired as officers in cities, boroughs, townships, and municipalities in Pennsylvania. The 919-hour curriculum is accredited and mandated through the Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission. Cadets successfully completed 27 exams, covering 5 modules of training.

The District 10 CTSP Cycling and Walking Safety Education Project was a materials-only non-infrastructure request with regional significance. IRHS was awarded \$56,647.00 in grant monies in May 2018. Bicycle, pedestrian education, and encouragement programs support Bicycle Friendly Community designations, which in turn can be used to support tourism.

IRHS graduated the first cohort of students in the IUP Paramedic clock hour program in the Spring of 2018 at the Citizens' Ambulance Service Westpike Training Complex. The program is primarily designed for future EMS personnel, but appropriate for anyone who may respond to emergencies. Cohort #2 and #3 are set to graduate in AY 18/19.



Dr. Louis Pesci, IRHS Director and IUP representatives presented at the first Governor's Emergency Preparedness Summit on Tuesday, October 3, 2017 in Hershey, Pennsylvania. IUP's workshop presentation detailed how a State System of Higher Education institution has assumed a leadership role in bringing together a few key stakeholders within Indiana County to identify obstacles, analyze processes, provide training opportunities, and move toward best practices in rural emergency preparedness. The panel shared their collective effort to respond to several recent events and operational

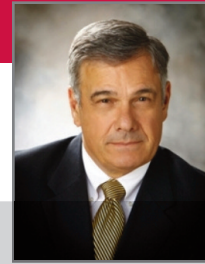
deficiencies, including, but not limited to, the opioid epidemic, celebratory events, first responder preparedness, and private/public sector issues.

Mr. Paterson joined the PA OSHA Program as a certified safety professional (CSP) in 2016. Before coming to IUP, Tom worked for Bechtel Power as a construction specialist during the construction of the Limerick Nuclear Generating Station, as well as a corporate professional with Pennsylvania Electric Company. His hands-on experience in manufacturing, heavy construction, ship-building, and the electrical utility industry allowed Mr. Paterson to apply his knowledge and skills to provide workable solutions to safety and health issues for the PA OSHA Consultation Program. Mr. Paterson will be missed.



IUP PA OSHA broke new ground in technology during 2017-2018. A new webinar campaign provided six live webinars, which were offered to over 500 people and were posted online to double the impact. PA OSHA consultants also expanded their influence through the creation of 25 separate safety and health training videos in their OSHA Focal Points Video Series.

IUP's PA OSHA Consultation Program continues to lead the region in the number of visits conducted per consultant and the number of hazards identified per visit and in serious hazard identification, identifying an average of 5.32 serious hazards per initial visit. In total the consultants removed 157,168 workers from risk of serious injury during the year.

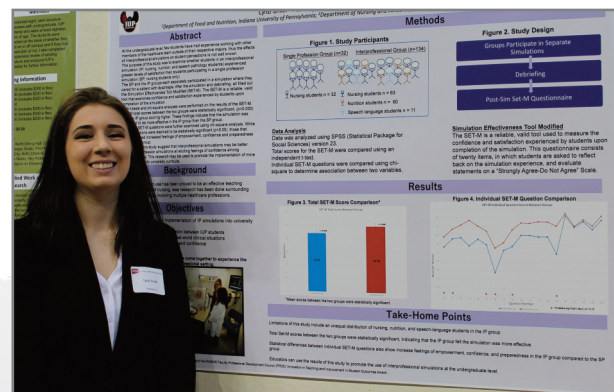

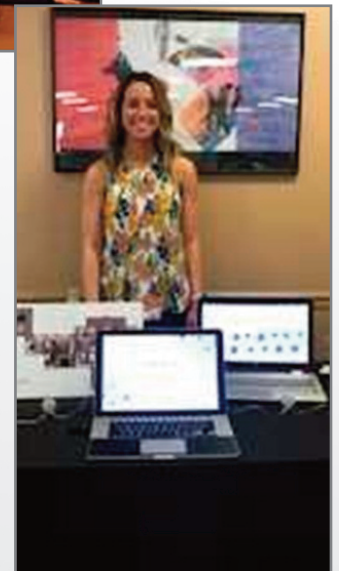


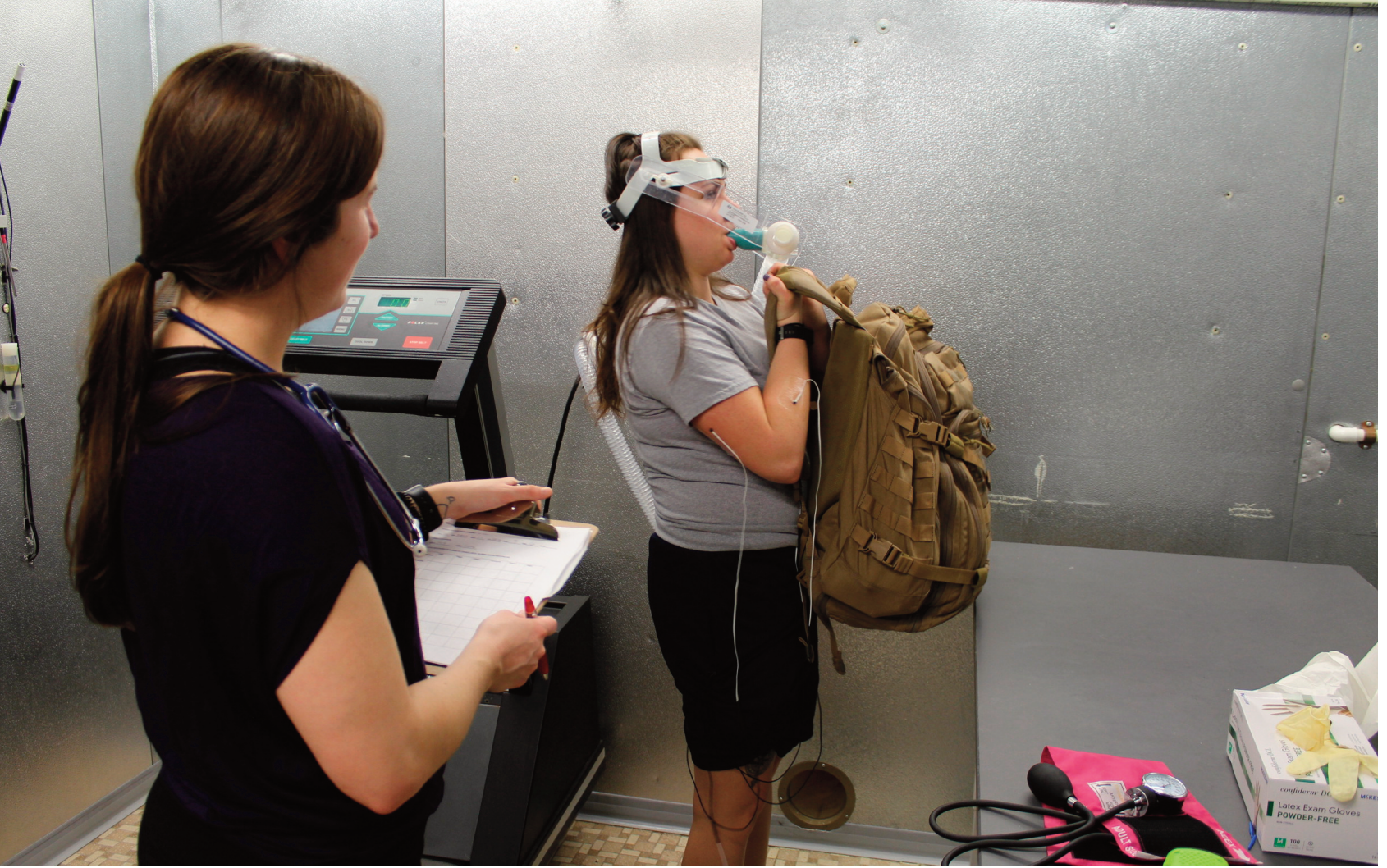

The Nor-Lake Environmental Chamber Room, located in the Center for Sport Science Research and Education in Zink Hall, was graciously donated by the NIOSH branch of the CDC located in Pittsburgh. Drs. Gerhart, Storti, and Pesci have received two grants for research using this chamber; the College of Health and Human Services Research Incentive Grant (\$2,500), and the Senate Fellowship Grant (\$6,945). Additionally, Drs. Gerhart and Bayles received an external contract (\$45,571) for research using the chamber through ALL COOL USA. This chamber is used predominantly for human physiology testing in extreme heat and high humid environments, with results of research extending to practical application within military and first responder populations.
